**LULAC National Leaders Convene in Milwaukee to Host  
National Executive Board Meeting**

*Two-day event will focus on policies and current affairs affecting  
Latino communities across the country*

*Milwaukee, Wisconsin* — The National Executive Board of The League of United Latin American Citizens (LULAC) will host its two-day national board meeting in Milwaukee, Wisconsin where they will discuss policies and current affairs affecting Latino communities across the United States. Among the attendees will be LULAC National President Hector Flores.

The meeting will take place at the Hyatt Regency Milwaukee from August 26-27.

Organizational leaders, representing various parts of the country, will focus on issues such as voting and election practices that discriminate in the electoral process; challenging the privatization of Social Security and any tax cut plan that would compromise its future stability; and opposing any legislation that threatens the rights of immigrants, including limiting legal immigration.

“We’re excited to host LULAC’s national board meeting in Milwaukee during the weekend of Milwaukee’s traditional Mexican Fiesta,” said Yolanda Santos Adams, LULAC Wisconsin State Director. “This meeting will give us the opportunity to continue the dialogue on national trends and determine the course of action LULAC members should take. It will also give national board members a preview of the city before the 2006 LULAC National convention scheduled in Milwaukee from June 26 to July 1, 2006.”

The League of United Latin American Citizens (LULAC) is the oldest and largest Latino civil rights organization in the United States. LULAC advances the economic condition, educational attainment, political influence, health, and civil rights of Hispanic Americans through community-based programs run by more than 700 LULAC councils nationwide.
